2008 PROGRAM SERVICES REPORT

ADVOCACY AND EDUCATION

WORLD MENTAL HEALTH DAY is the only global mental health education and awareness campaign focusing specifically on mental health and mental disorders. Initiated by the WFMH in 1992, World Mental Health Day is now observed on October 10th in over 100 countries. Each year, the WFMH establishes a new theme and distributes over 7,000 packets of educational materials to support that theme to grassroots organizations worldwide. For many, this is the only mental health material they will receive over the year. The theme for **World Mental Health Day 2008** was “Making Mental Health a Global Priority: Scaling up Services through Citizen Action and Advocacy.”

This theme addressed the continuing need to “make mental health issues a global priority”, and to stress the all too-often neglected fact that mental health is an international concern. Mental disorders do not choose their victims; they occur in all cultures and at all stages of the life span. The 2008 campaign was launched on October 10 at an event held at the Pan American Health Organization headquarters in Washington DC, and sponsored jointly by WFMH and PAHO.

INFORMATION SERVICES is a major ongoing program service of the WFMH Secretariat. Through this service, WFMH staff annually responds to several thousand written, e-mail, telephone, and website requests for mental health information materials, service referrals, research and education resource references, covering a wide range of subject materials. This function also includes updating and enhancement of the WFMH website and exhibiting at selected conferences of other organizations. Deborah Maguire, WFMH Director of Global Awareness and Information Services, has lead responsibility for WFMH Information Services. This is one of the major daily general program support functions for all staff. The increased number of international public information and awareness packets developed by WFMH over the past few years has greatly expanded information services inquiries and requests.

BREAKING THROUGH BARRIERS DEPRESSION AWARENESS CAMPAIGN: WFMH was delighted to continue promoting the *Breaking Through Barriers* campaign, which we believe is helping address the need to provide accurate and up-to-date information about depression in ways that are easily accessible to individuals with symptoms of depression, their family members and their friends. The campaign aims to improve worldwide standards of care in the diagnosis and treatment of depression and reduce the stigma that surrounds the disorder and serves as a barrier to effective treatment and recovery. The resource website remains active and can be accessed through the WFMH website at www.wfmh.org.

“LIFE IS A CLASSROOM” ADHD AWARENESS CAMPAIGN: During 2008, WFMH’s partnership with Eli Lilly around ADHD continued with a new international survey to learn more about the emphasis by physicians treating children with ADHD on social and emotional development. The survey, *ADHD 360: Examining Parent and Physician Beliefs on the Impact and Treatment of ADHD Beyond the Core Symptoms*, was conducted by Harris Interactive on behalf of Eli Lilly and Company in partnership with World Federation for Mental Health (WFMH). Survey participants included 663 physicians who treat ADHD and 719 parents of children with the disorder from Canada, China, France, Germany, Japan, South Korea, Mexico, Spain and the United Kingdom. The results of the survey were released through an international webcast from Chicago, Illinois in October 2008.

WFMH DISASTER RESPONSE INITIATIVE: Modest funding from the WFMH Disaster Response Initiative helped grassroots mental health organizations in India and Sri Lanka respond to the mental health consequences of the December 2004 Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami during the early days of that major disaster. The WFMH Disaster Response Initiative has a dual charge: (1) to seek opportunities and means to provide direct assistance to WFMH member NGOs based in disaster zones that are providing mental health assistance to victims and relief workers; and (2) to prepare member organizations to respond to the mental health consequences of future natural and manmade disaster situations. In 2007, volunteers, staff, and member organizations provided input to the development of the *IASC’s Guidelines on Mental Health and Psychosocial Support in Emergency Settings* through the review process. At the 2007 WFMH World Mental Health Congress, a Pre-Congress Forum on Mental Health Responses in Disaster Situations was convened to increase the awareness and involvement of WFMH member organizations in disaster response preparedness. In August 2008, WFMH convened an

International Forum on Mental Health and Psychosocial Support Services in London, England and was attended by representatives of mental health and humanitarian service non-governmental organizations from around the world.

“KEEPING CARE COMPLETE: AN INTERNATIONAL SURVEY OF FAMILY MEMBERS AND CAREGIVERS OF PEOPLE WITH SCHIZOPHRENIA AND BIPOLAR DISORDER” – WFMH and Eli Lilly released the results of the first international survey to gain the perspective of family members and caregivers of people with serious and persistent mental illnesses – schizophrenia, schizoaffective disorder, and bipolar disorder in September 2006. The survey responses came from caregivers in Australia, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Spain and the UK. Research into schizophrenia and bipolar disorder rarely opens a dialogue with family caregivers about their important role in the day-to-day life of their family loved ones who suffer from these three illnesses. During 2007, a packet of materials providing fact sheets summarizing the results of the survey from each of the countries involved in the project was released and disseminated widely. Special symposia based on the results of the survey were conducted at the 2007 World Mental Health Congress in Hong Kong and at the First Congress of the Psychiatric Association of Eastern Europe and the Balkans in Thessaloniki, Greece. Keeping Care Complete materials were also distributed at the annual conference of EUFAMI.

In 2008, the Keeping Care Complete project continued with an international survey highlighting how family support, and how finding and staying on the right treatment can make a difference in keeping patients with serious mental illness well. 897 psychiatrists from 8 countries were interviewed for the survey to gain their insights on how family caregivers, stigma, treatment non-adherence and relapse affect the lives of people living with these debilitating illnesses. Findings show that psychiatrists have frequently seen how relapse can be a devastating blow to both individuals and their families, and how this has resulted in hospitalization, employment loss, incarceration or even suicide. The results of the survey were released in September at a media seminar held in Barcelona, Spain.

WFMH REPRESENTATION AT THE UNITED NATIONS AND ITS SPECIALIZED AGENCIES: Since its inception, WFMH has enjoyed a close working relationship with the United Nations and its specialized agencies, including the World Health Organization and UNESCO. During 2008, WFMH’s cadre of volunteer representatives at the UN headquarters in New York, maintained the Federation’s participation in the UN NGO Committee on Mental Health, participated in annual sessions of the UN Commission on the Status of Women, and provided representation in NGO committees addressing issues such as children, human rights, and the rights of people with disabilities. WFMH organized and convened a special workshop during the Commission on the Status of Women session. WFMH representatives participated in the June 2008 UN High Level Meeting on HIV/AIDS.

At the United Nations in New York City, WFMH is represented by Lead Representative Nancy Wallace, and by Dr. Ricki Kantowitz, Richard Donahue, and Linda Conte.

In Geneva, WFMH volunteer representatives monitor activities relating to mental health through the World Health Organization and the UN Commission on Human Rights. In 2008, WFMH joined the WHO NGO Alliance for a Global Strategy on Alcohol and is represented on this Alliance by lead Geneva representative, Myrna Lachenal. Also representing WFMH in Geneva are Dr. Stan Flache and Anne Yamada-Vetsch.

WFMH CENTER FOR TRANSCULTURAL MENTAL HEALTH: Throughout 2007, WFMH continued the development of the WFMH Center for Transcultural Mental Health, a project initiated in November 2006. The Center was established as an on-going program component within the Secretariat, and its aims are to develop and disseminate information and support to mental health advocacy, patient/caregiver, and service delivery organizations and groups on issues pertaining to transcultural mental health issues, concerns, policies, and best practices. Two major activities for the Center during 2007 were the International Experts Forum on Mental Health in a Changing World (February 2007), and the First WFMH International Conference on Transcultural Mental Health (October 2007 in Minneapolis, Minnesota). In 2008, funding cuts necessitated a reduction in the scope of work for the Center. However, its work continued through the convening, in December 2008, of an International Experts Forum on Reducing Disparities in Mental Health Services for Ethnic Minorities and Immigrants, held in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

PRESENTATIONS AND REPRESENTATION AT INTERNATIONAL CONGRESSES: An important means for WFMH to reach new audiences, cultivate existing relationships, and enhance its identity and credibility throughout the global mental health sector is through participation at selected major national and international conferences and congresses. This participation is most often by the presentation of plenary session talks, workshop presentations, and staffing of the WFMH exhibit. Most often, plenary and symposia presentations will be made by the WFMH President, Immediate Past President, President-elect, Vice-President for Program Development, or Secretary-General/CEO. SECOND MENTAL HEALTH ADVOCACY LEADERSHIP FORUM: WFMH organized and coordinated the second mental health advocacy leadership forum by bringing together the key staff and volunteer leaders of EUFAMI, GAMIAN-EUROPE, Mental Health Europe, the World Fellowship for Schizophrenia and Related Disorders, and WFMH for a two-day summit meeting held in Toronto, Canada in July 2008. This meeting served to promote greater understanding of the mission, principles, and programs of the organizations, improve channels of communication, and promote increased collaboration among these leading international patient/service user, family/care giver, and advocacy organizations.

INTERNATIONAL AWARENESS PACKET ON GENERALIZED ANXIETY DISORDER: This packet provides up-to-date, evidence-based information and awareness materials for use by mental health organizations to increase understanding of the symptoms, treatment and management of Generalized Anxiety Disorder.

INTERNATIONAL AWARENESS PACKET ON BIPOLAR DISORDER: This comprehensive awareness packet on Bipolar Disorder is targeted to individuals, families, and the general healthcare practitioner and is intended to inform and educate people who are affected by Bipolar Disorder.

THE ONLINE DIRECTORY OF MENTAL HEALTH PATIENT/SERVICE USER, FAMILY MEMBER/CARER, AND ADVOCACY ORGANIZATIONS: This major project created the first comprehensive on-line international directory of non-governmental organizations and support groups serving patients/service users and families/caregivers of people with mental illnesses, and to identify mental health advocacy and education organizations (such as Mental Health Associations). The directory was launched through the WFMH website in February 2008.

INTERNATIONAL AWARENESS PACKET ON SCHIZOPHRENIA: This comprehensive awareness packet on Schizophrenia is targeted to individuals, families, and the general healthcare practitioner and is intended to inform and educate people who are affected by Schizophrenia.

BUILDING AWARENESS-REDUCING RISK: MENTAL ILLNESS AND SUICIDE MONOGRAPH:

In follow up to the 2006 International Experts Forum on Mental Illness and Suicide, a monograph summarizing the discussions, key messages and recommendations from the Forum was published in 2008 and distributed to member organizations and others working in the field of suicide prevention and mental health.

WFMH AFRICA INITIATIVE PLANNING PROJECT

The World Federation for Mental Health (WFMH) received a planning grant in August 2007 from The Ford Foundation to design, plan and organize the first initiative in Africa focused to address the mental health consequences of HIV/AIDS for caregivers of people living with AIDS and their families. The ultimate objective of the Initiative will be to increase attention of policy makers, governmental agencies, and non-governmental organizations about the mental health needs of people living with HIV/AIDS and their family caregivers and to strengthen the availability of support programs and services for caregivers and family members of people living with AIDS. A principal focus of the Initiative will be to increase the capacity of grassroots organizations working in the areas of mental health and HIV/AIDS to recognize the mental health supports needed by caregivers and family members, and to promote the development of training and information strategies for grassroots organization staff members to address those needs. The first major activity of the Initiative was the convening of an International Experts Forum addressing the mental health consequences of HIV/AIDS held in Cape Town, South Africa, 29 -31 January 2008. This Forum brought together 23 experts from across Africa, and from the United States and India, to help develop the framework on which the implementation of the Initiative will be based. Efforts were ongoing during 2008 to design potential program activities and build a strong network of supporting organizations in Africa, along with the preparation of funding proposals to cultivate support for the Initiative's 2009 implementation phase.

THE MERGER OF THE WORLD FELLOWSHIP FOR SCHIZOPHRENIA AND ALLIED DISORDERS WITH WFMH

Work began in the Spring of 2008 to complete a merger of the World Fellowship for Schizophrenia and Allied Disorders with WFMH. This work started after the WFSAD Board approached WFMH about the possibility of a merger. The WFMH Board authorized the establishment and the cultivation of funding for a new WFMH program office, the Center for Family and Consumer Advocacy and Support (CFCAS) to provide the vehicle for incorporating the programs of WFSAD in the WFMH organizational structure. The governing bodies of WFMH and WFSAD approved the merger resolution in July 2008. Since then, efforts continue to finalize the merger and to cultivate funding to support the Center. In November, WFMH and WFSAD entered into a joint agreement to complete a partially funded WFSAD project to develop a suicide prevention program for family carers of people with serious mental illnesses.

PROMOTION AND PREVENTION

WFMH OFFICE FOR PROMOTION OF MENTAL HEALTH AND PREVENTION IN MENTAL

DISORDERS: The WFMH Office for Promotion of Mental Health and Prevention in Mental Disorders was established in 2006 within the WFMH Secretariat as a means to formalize and highlight the Federation's historical and ongoing leadership around promotion and prevention within the global mental health sector. Through the Program Office, WFMH continues its co-sponsorship for the biennial World Conference on Promotion of Mental Health and Prevention of Mental and Behavioral Disorders and serves as the Secretariat for the Global Consortium for Advancement of Promotion and Prevention in Mental Health while seeking new resources to expand its efforts in the areas of mental health promotion and education. Dr. Elena Berger directs the WFMH Office for Promotion and Prevention.

FIFTH WORLD CONFERENCE ON PROMOTION OF MENTAL HEALTH AND PREVENTION OF

MENTAL AND BEHAVIORAL DISORDERS: The Fifth World Conference on Promotion of Mental Health and Prevention of Mental and Behavioral Disorders, co-sponsored by WFMH, The Carter Center Mental Health Program, and the Clifford Beers Foundation, was held in Melbourne, Australia in September 2008, with over 800 registered participants. The Victorian Health Foundation (VicHealth) was the Host Organization for the Fifth World Conference. During 2007, Dr. Elena Berger provided liaison with the VicHealth Foundation in regard to WFMH's co-sponsorship of this conference.

THE GLOBAL CONSORTIUM FOR ADVANCEMENT OF PROMOTION AND PREVENTION IN MENTAL HEALTH (GCAPP) developed from earlier work of the World Federation for Mental Health and The Clifford Beers Foundation of the U.K. The Global Consortium for the Advancement of Promotion and Prevention in Mental Health was officially launched in January 2004, and expanded to include additional organization members at a meeting in Dublin, Ireland in April 2005. Since mid-2006, WFMH has provided coordinating services as the GCAPP Interim Secretariat. Dr. Elena Berger, WFMH Director, Office of Promotion & Prevention had lead responsibility for coordination of the GCAPP and related promotion and prevention activities. At the Consortium's annual meeting in September 2008, Professor Helen Herrman and Mr. Charles Ray became WFMH's volunteer representatives to the GCAPP Executive Committee.

MEMBERSHIP, MEMBER SERVICES, AND PUBLICATIONS

Membership cultivation, retention and service are major ongoing functions of the WFMH Secretariat. WFMH's membership is comprised of four categories. Voting Member Organizations must have at least a national scope/constituency and have a primary mental health mission. These organizations represent WFMH's corporate membership and have voting rights at the annual Member Assembly meeting. Affiliate Member Organizations can have less than a national scope/constituency and must have at least some level of activity in mental health advocacy, education or service. Affiliate Member organizations do not hold voting rights at the Member Assembly. Individual members come from a variety of organizations and interest in the mental health sector, and are essentially contributing members with no voting rights. Life Members are also individual members who pay a one-time membership contribution of \$500. They are non-voting members. The Secretariat provides communication services to all categories of WFMH members, conducts ongoing membership cultivation, retention and recruitment efforts, and works with the WFMH Nominating Committee and Resolutions Committee on matters pertaining to the participation of the membership in the annual Member Assembly. In 2008, a new MemberClicks database management system was implemented in order to improve the capacity for recording, tracking and communicating with WFMH's members worldwide.

WFMH WEBSITE DEVELOPMENT

A major effort throughout 2007, involving all members of the WFMH staff, was the complete revision and redesign of the WFMH website, www.wfmh.org. As one of the primary means for communicating WFMH's mission and activities to the broader general public, the website was redesigned and formatted following the five major "pillars" of WFMH's strategic positioning plan: Mental Health Awareness and Information Services, Promotion & Prevention, International Advocacy and Constituency-Building, Mental Human Rights and Advocacy, and Recovery-Focused Interventions. Special sections on the site highlight major activities such as World Mental Health Day and the WFMH Center for Transcultural Mental Health. The new website was launched on January 2, 2008. New sections added to the website in 2008 included an information page commemorating the 60th anniversary of WFMH's organization and a page dedicated to the WFMH Africa Initiative.

2009 WFMH WORLD MENTAL HEALTH CONGRESS

Planning began in 2008 for the 2009 WFMH World Mental Health Congress scheduled to be held in Athens, Greece, 2- 6 September 2009. The Host Organizing Committee for the Congress is chaired by WFMH Board member Professor George Christodoulou. During 2008, a section promoting the Congress was placed on the WFMH website and promotional information was forwarded to an extensive database of members and contacts. WFMH staff became involved in planning of several aspects of the Congress program, including the WFMH-sponsored memorial lectures and the World Mental Health Day campaign plenary session.

PUBLICATIONS

The primary publications of WFMH are a regular newsletter and an Annual Report. With the second issue of the 2008 newsletter, an electronic version of the newsletter was initiated and will replace the hard copy version in 2009.

2008 FINANCIAL REPORT

The annual independent audit of the WFMH financial records was conducted by the firm of Penan & Scott, PC, a Certified Public Accounting firm located in Rockville, Maryland (USA). The auditor's statement noted "*In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Federation as of December 31, 2008, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in conformity with U. S. generally accepted accounting principles*".
